






Projected county population of 550,000 by 2040




2025 Hays County population estimated at 303,252


Projected municipal water needs in 2070




Hays County 2023-2070 Water & Reuse \$437.026 million (Region L IPP)

Rapid growth strains water resources.


Clean water sustains community health, tourism, and property values.

Outreach and Engagement


- 1,775 students & teachers reached; 30+ events
- Storm-drain markers installed
- 480+ direct stakeholder engagements;
- 12,000+ community touchpoints
- Collaborations: BMP evaluations, stormwater, "no dumping" signage; community updates, One Water workshops

- One Water Resolutions adopted county-wide
- Subdivision rule participation, mapping, signage
- Green infrastructure, rain gardens, OSSF inspections
- Stormwater, wastewater, development planning integration

Planned Actions

- Continue coordination with Executive Committee to assess priorities
- Hays County subdivision revision engagement
- Inspect and map stormwater/wastewater systems
- Launch Water Wise program Fall 2025 series of events
- Riparian workshop October 28 (Wimberley) + events later in 2025-2026
- Addressing citizen water quality, development, and stormwater concerns
- Engage upper Blanco River stakeholders
- Returning for county budget request in next the cycle




